

Memories of 1st Mobberley Mallory Scout Group



It all began when.....

Colin Stuart Jaffrey was a Scout in the 1st Alderley Edge Group during the First World War. That Group was founded in 1910 and was in the District of Macclesfield.

Colin, like many of England's youth in those days could not wait to go in the forces so he enlisted under age. He was badly wounded shortly after going to

France and spent the rest of the war in hospital in Denham and whilst convalescing he became a young leader in the local Scout troop.
Finally returning home he re-joined Alderley for a short period. Lots of Wilmslow boys were making a weekly trek to the

Scout Hall in Talbot Road which is still the Scout H.Q. today.

Anxious to forward his leadership ambition he attempted to start a troop in Wilmslow but the District Scout authorities in Macclesfield and the patrons of the Alderley Group were not happy to be losing 50% of their members to this new venture. In consequence of this resistance Colin approached the Stockport District officials who were more amenable to his proposals and supported his application to be a warranted Scouter in their District. Colin's first warrant was dated 1920 and it hung for many years in the Wilmslow Scout Hall in Alma Lane. Having succeeded in forming one troop and full of enthusiasm to expand Scouting further afield, Colin, with the help of Mr Daniels, the then publican of the Church Inn in Mobberley, started a satelite troop which met in the outbuildings of the pub (many years

later to be known as the Parsons Nose restaurant). Dick Hulme, who became quite a pillar of Scouting in the village in later years was one of the first members. Both Mobberley and Wilmslow boys combined forces during the summers of the 1920s to go away to camp in Deganwy. These camps were big, following the pattern of the Boys Brigade style with lines of ex-army bell tents and

centralised cooking using exarmy field kitchen equipment and with volunteer Mums in residence as catering staff.

Colin's pet activities amounted to lots of fitness training using dumbbells and Indian clubs and doing exercises in tumbling and gymnastics in preparation for displays of pyramids put on at local carnivals.

In the late 1920s Mobberley's link with Wilmslow reduced somewhat for several reasons. With the increase in interest in Scouting and its need to have a national operational structure that suited its development, local groups consisting of Cub Packs, Scout Troops and Rover Crews were realigned into specific Districts more appropriate to community interests and balanced management. Alderley, no longer under the control of the Macclesfield Commissioner and other groups that had sprung up in Handforth, Chelford and Holmes Chapel, together with Wilmslow and Mobberley were linked together to make a new and quite separate District in the East Cheshire Scout County.

In their new District, Colin was appointed District Scoutmaster which he combined with his role as Group Scoutmaster with Wilmslow, leaving him with little time to continue leadership in Mobberley. Interest in

Scouting in Mobberley at this stage appears to have lessened if not temporarily expired. A Captain Helm came on the scene as a leader of the Boys Club which was established on land on Hall Bank, given by the then owner of Mobberley Old Hall, Miss Bishop.

A wooden hut was erected for their use. The Girl Guides, who later took over this building, were at that time meeting in outbuildings at Barclay Hall, then known as Mobberley New Hall. The Barclay family promoted Guiding in Mobberley and members of the Barclay family were in leadership there for some time. Also, two sisters from the Carver family who lived in the Old Hall before Miss Bishop were known to be Brown Owl and Tawny Owl in the Brownie Pack. It was somewhat later that Guides came to occupy the hut on Hall Bank. Meanwhile, Scouting in Mobberley at this point in history is shrouded in mystery.

Present day Warford Park, actually situated in Great Warford and previously home to Mobberley Boys School was initially the Open Air School, a Manchester institution. It is known that a Scout Group existed there and that in addition to normal Scouting activities, the Group had a sizeable Drum and Bugle Band. Whether local boys were allowed to be in membership at the School is not known.



Local people who came into maminence particularly in the 1930s and later were Dick Hulme who lived am Beech Hill, George Oatley who Freed at 'Oakdene', Broad Oak Lane and Eric Neville who in later life lived in Pavement Lane. These three fellows were in leadership both with the village and also at Margaret Barclay School. Links with 1st Wilmslow Group reduced during these pre-war years and apart from the Group's presence at the annual St George's Day parade and service, competition camps and special events embracing the King George V Silver Jubilee and the coronation of George VI, little has been recorded about them.

The Group did have its own premises, a wooden hut on Town Lane farm land, close by the Victory Hall. During the 1939-1945 war years, this building doubled up as the ARP Warden H.Q. This hut was later re-sited on land adjacent to the Victory Hall. In it there was a plaque in memory of Christopher Longridge, which is now to be seen in the Committee Room of the Victory Hall Memorial Club.

At some stage in this period the Group became dormant. Dick Hulme, a teacher at the Margaret Barclay School was able to keep the Margaret Barclay School Group running with the help of George Oatley, maintaining a membership of twenty plus boys. In October 1949 the Village Troop was reformed by Dick and at the 1950 census had sixteen members rising to twenty seven in 1952, which became a special year in the life of Mobberley Scouts so far.

The District St George's Day Parade and service, which had routinely been held either in Alderley Edge at St Philip's Church or in St Bartholomew's Church in Wilmslow for years, had a venue re-vamp. The District Scout Council decided that in consecutive years, Holmes Chapel, Chelford, Handforth, and Mobberley should take turns to organise the event. Holmes Chapel had a big town church with a gallery which was capable of accommodating the whole parade of

Cubs and Scouts. The other villages had problems which resulted in the sections being split up for the occasion, i.e. Cub Scouts being "Methodists" for the day and the Scouts, Senior Scouts and Rovers going to the Anglican church. In 1952 when it was Mobberley's turn to host the event, services were held at either end of Hall Lane and the parade of Cubs and Scouts marched into Barclay Park to have a special assembly with the Margaret Barclay School Group – quite an occasion. The service was taken by Rev H S Randle.



1954 - 41st Annual Report of the Alderley Edge, Wilmslow & District Boy Scouts Association

"Bob a Job Week - Again it was necessary for the Chief Scout to ask all members of the Movement to earn two shillings per head to meet the needs of Imperial Headquarters which could not be met from income and the Committee are pleased to report that each Group raised its full quota.

Groups acted as sellers of the official programme in connection with the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II"

In the 1950s there was a general upsurge in the interest of Scouting and from a static membership of 350 or so in the District, within ten years the membership figures had increased to over 500. Gerald Brooks had been appointed Assistant District Commissioner for the Scout section and had devised a system of training for all the troops in the District to follow. Miss Cunliffe of Alderley Edge was so impressed by the idea that she presented a trophy to go to the most efficient Troop, who were tested over a period of two weekends in the Summer. All Troops were required to enter and whereas there was great enthusiasm amongst most, the reverse effect was felt in Mobberley where a leadership vacuum occurred due to Dick Hulme's retirement and the demolition of the ageing Scout Hut.

Local Set Up

A Group covers Cubs, Scouts, Senior Scouts and Rover Scouts

Cubs - ages 8 to 11 years are in charge of a Cubmaster (C.M.)

Scouts - ages 11 to 15 years, in charge of a Scoutmaster (S.M.)

Seniors - ages 15 to 18 years, in charge of a Senior scout Leader (S.S.L).

Rovers—ages 18 to 24 years led by a Rover Scout Leader (R.S.L.)

Responsibility for the entire group rests with a Group Scout Master (G.S.M).

1965

1st Mobberley met at "The Barn", Dukenfield Hall, Mobberley by kind permission of Colonel Teddy Morton. The GSM was A MacBrown. Meeting nights were: Cubs - Thursday, Scouts - Friday. Necker was Blue with Red edging.

Mobberley Cubs came 2nd in the Annual District Sports which were held on Saturday 24th July at Ryleys Playing Field, Harden Park, Alderley Edge

1966

Wolf Cubs Jubilee Year

Harold Horry was acting G.S.M. The Cubs gained the following badges: cyclist, entertainer, first aider and house orderly.

On 29th January we were among the 5,000 Cubs who cheered and clapped at a special Circus Rally at Belle-Vue.

On 18th June Cubs presented a Cub Cabaret and Coffee evening which was enjoyed by over 200 parents and friends.

County Commissioners Challenge -

"Each Patrol Leader should engage his patrol in a named activity each month from October 1965 to March 1966. Patrol Leaders accepted the challenge which consisted of a Night Adventure, Pioneering, a good turn, exploration. backwoods cooking and camping. The December challenge benefited the elderly in the District by having Scouts do their gardening, shopping and chopped firewood. Pioneering projects were interesting - free standing flagpoles, hoists, skylons, a ballista and rafts. Roast beef, baked potatoes, barbequed mushrooms, tomato and bacon followed by coffee, all prepared without utensils for the Backwoods Cooking Challenge. The Scouts even learned a novel way of boiling water. Take a Jaffa orange, cut off the top, scoop out the fruit, dry and fill with water, boil on a hot ember fire".

1967

1st Mobberley won the District Sports Trophy on 22nd July and visited the Chief Scouts Rally at Devisdale on 20th May 1967. The Chief Scout was Sir Charles Maclean. Despite a very wet weekend the Scouts enjoyed many activities including archaeology, canoe building, car maintenance, casualty simulation, folk dancing, golf. instant cooking, judo, model car track, mountain craft, obstacle course, offbeat pioneering, sea scouting, scout cars, ski slope, weather station, weight lifting, trampolines and various shows by the Army and the Air Force. These were followed by a Sunset Show and the Alderley District Scout Band performed just before flag down.

Colin Jaffrey retired as District Commissioner but remained GSL of 1st Wilmslow and Chairman of the BP Guild. Harold Horry took over the position of District Commissioner.

Cub Scout Section included the Bronze, Silver and Gold arrow, the Scout section's basic skills were covered by the Scout Standard, Advanced Standard and the Chief Scout's Award. This would then be followed by the Venture Award which would be achieved as a member of Venture Scouts (aged 16 to 20). The final and most coveted award was to be the Queen's Scout Award which would be presented at Windsor on St George's Day.

LADIES - interested in helping to look after 24-30 boys aged 8-11 years, one evening per week required in most localities. Pleasant relief from housework and husbands.

1969

Saw the introduction of "Scoutabout" a programme of events to encourage recruitment of adults.

Mobberley held a Scout & Guide bonfire party on 5th November at Dukenfield Hall and a Cheese & Wine evening on 7th November at Mobberley Cricket Club.

There was also a cabaret show called "Boy-O-Boy", an all boy cabaret show with a cast of 100.

1970 - Extract from Scoutabout 70

"The Cub Pack was thriving but the Scout troop was dormant due to lack of leadership.

No Scout Group enjoys the use of premises with such a Scouty atmosphere. A beautiful reproduction of the famous portrait of Baden-Powell by Jaeger, in oils, hangs in the spacious lofty 19th century barn at Dukenfield Hall. The rough brick walls, exposed roof timbers and the trophies of some long departed hunter seem to awaken the magic of Scouting's early history. In these premises each Monday evening throughout the year, apart from the darkest and coldest of winter evenings, a very thriving Cub Pack meet. They carry out a very full programme of activities and enjoy Cub Scouting par excellence. At this moment in time however, the boy who reaches the age of 11½ must either leave or travel 4 – 6 miles to take part in Scouting activities.

New equipment and good quality tents lie idle, boys who have found enjoyment in collective activity in the Cubs now find gaps in their free time that Scouting could easily fill. With premises, equipment and finances available new Scouters would find their task of leadership so much easier. This picture of 1971 could be so different if someone would volunteer.

An Extension Group for physically handicapped children which meets every Thursday in the grounds or premises attached to the Mobberley Hall. Originally evacuated from Manchester at the outbreak of War in 1939 it has become part of the Cheshire scene and taken the name of one of Cheshire's well known Guide Commissioners. If one is unaccustomed to the needs of children with such severe handicaps it is hard to imagine the way in which Scouting must be conducted. Most, if not all of the boys rely on a wheel chair for mobility and the greater part of training given by Scouters is only possible with assistance from the nursing staff. An evening of slides or "home movies" of camps etc. with a "camp fire" to close really makes them feel part of the great family of Scouts."

1971 - Extracts from the Pack Log Book of the Margaret Barclay School, Mobberley Hall Cub Scouts

<u>September 16th</u> - We practised the Grand Howl. This caused some merriment when they realised they were allowed to shout as hard as they could.

<u>September 30th</u> - A lovely evening which we spent entirely out of doors.... Michael spotted two baby rabbits eating grass so we stalked as close as we could to observe....

October 7th - Skip and the Scouts joined the meeting at 6.30 and we had a presentation to Akela Chapman, a picture bought by the boys, in appreciation for all her work with the boys.

October 14th - The Rev Eric Challener came to see us and Ian & Richard performed a mime on window cleaning. They both passed their miming test.

October 21st

We had a game of Soldiers & Brigands which turned out to be the most popular.

1971 - Extracts from the Pack Log Book of the Margaret Barclay School, Mobberley Hall Cub Scouts

October 28th - All the Cubs washed their own scarves.

November 11th - The Cubs listened to a bit of 'the Cub Scout Handbook' on a record.

December 2nd - We divided into sixes and had a quiz 'Top of the Form'style. The Cubs then chose to play Bean Bag Bombs which was very hilarious.

1972 - Extracts from the Pack Log Book of the Margaret Barclay School, Mobberley Hall Cub Scouts

January 13th - The Cubs were in good form for their first meeting of term and had noticed that Akela had put their East Cheshire badges on during the holidays......

January 20th - We played a game of guessing the hidden objects under beakers...... We learned how to tie a reef knot.

February 17th - All 9 Cubs were present for the first time this term. We had a lively game of lifeboats and after that we tackled the subject of home safety. We all struck matches the correct way.

9th March - Tonight we concentrated on 'know your District'. The Blue Six were given a list of things to find, ie. fire extinguishers in the phone book while Yellow Six learned how to use the phone in an emergency.

17th March - Owing to ill health, this term's work has got a bit behind, only one out of 9 meetings were all present. Nevertheless they have all worked hard and got a lot of fun out of their 'Cubbing".

29th June - We went off to the woods for a campfire! The Cubs were told what wood to collect and all tried hard to break it up. Roy & Richard picked the site and cleared it with sticks. We soon had a splendid fire going and then enjoyed some soup.

1974 - St George's Day Parade—Sunday 28th April



1974 - May 18th - Cheshire County Rally - Oulton Park -

The Chief Scout visits 8,000 at camp. Nearly 3,000 will camp and another 5,000 members will visit. Today we met the Chief Scout, Sir William Gladstone, great grandson of the Liberal Prime Minister. At about 3pm all the Cubs and Scouts assembled. The Chief Scout spoke to all the Cubs and shook each one by the left hand. The CountyCommissioner also spoke to us all and we had yet another photograph taken in the rain! Everyone gave the Chief Scout three cheers.

The Margaret Barclay School for spastic children was accommodated in the spacious Mobberley New Hall, one time home of the Barclay family from which it took its name.

Thursday evening was Scout evening. The Cub Scouts under the leadership of Elizabeth Orford and Jean Mottershead regularly enjoyed a full programme of activity organised to suit. This is followed by an equally absorbing programme for the Scout section supervised by Joe Woodcock.

On 31st March 1975 changes were made in municipal boundaries. The East Cheshire County Scout Council was divided with 55% of the membership moving into Greater Manchester East, 20% into Greater Manchester West and moving the balance, including Macclesfield, Alderley Edge and Knutsford into a smaller but unified Cheshire.

1975

Saw the Scout troop regularly joining with Alderley Edge for joint programmes and the Cubs enjoyed a pack holiday at Hathersage and a Sixer & Seconder Camp

Margaret Barclay enjoyed visits from other groups, including the Handforth Venture Unit who together with the Ranger guides put on a show for the school as a whole. The troop took part in the 'paper chase'. One of the boys, Michael Reilly was chosen to attend the parade at Windsor on 20th April.

A REMARKABLE MAN

Dr. John Frederick Wilkinson, elected in April 1976 for his sixth term of office as President of the Alderley Edge, Wilmslow and District Scout Council, is a remarkable man. He has many claims to fame — his biography occupies a large slice of Who's Who, covering an eventful life over more than threequarters of a century.

And it is possible that he is the oldest surviving Scout with continuous service since joining the Movement nearly 69 years ago, surely our President." We are proud of

So on that first Friday night a year later before the sale on the Saturday, Barbara and I drove with her car full of jumble (most likely Better Wear!) to the Victory Hall to a sight that took my breath away, I had been used to a jumble sale of fairly modest amounts of stuff but here was a mountain of black bags and all sorts of things piled high in the small room of the Hall.

Barbara then introduced me to her merry band of helpers with "this is my friend from London he has come all the way to help." So began the ritual of first putting up tables and the rails for the clothes followed by the opening of the bags and what treasure was found! It never seemed to stop coming in, the stage became full, the tables were full and yet it still came. What struck me very hard was how everybody got on with the job chatting away and calling out "Barbara" or more often "Nurse" every so often and Barbara greeting people with "Hi Love." It seemed to me that I had been added to a kind of family all here for the good of the Scouts and Guides but having a kind of party while sorting out the jumble.



Since that first jumble sale I have only missed at the most two sales. I have met an amazing group of people over the years, mostly people from Mobberley, and it has been a great privilege to have known so many lovely and friendly people who year after year greet me each year as though I have never been away. It is also sad that so many helpers who I met in the early days are no longer with us and I find myself remembering them when I come to the hall. There is something very special about the jumble sale: the way people from all walks of life come to help in so many ways and pick up from the last year as though it had been last week and also the regulars who come every year to the sale who buy similar stuff (they must have big sheds).

Finally I have to say a word about Barbara, for without her the jumble would be very different. She has such drive and energy over the jumble sale, the organising, the running of it, the sheer stimulation that she gives off to other people is simply amazing and you cannot help being caught up in it. Long may it continue.
