Mobberley led the annual St George's Parade and the service was held at St Philip's Church in Alderley Edge.

The First Beaver Scout colonies were formed.



The Scouts regularly attended Church parade at St Wilfrid's Church on the first Sunday of every month, together with 1st Mobberley Guides and Brownies.

Harold Horry was presented with the Silver Wolf, Scouting's highest honour for service.

Death of Teddy Morton, one time District President and benefactor of 1st Mobberley. Colonel Morton bequeathed the magnificent sum of £10,000 to Mobberley Scouts to build a new headquarters, as Colonel Morton was always aware that upon his death Mobberley Scouts would be made "homeless".

The Scouts were given formal notice to quit Dukenfield Hall by 15th May due to the fact that Mrs Morton was selling the Hall. The new owners did however allow the Scouts until 31st July to remove all their equipment.

Some of the equipment was stored at Springwood Farm, Pavement Lane, by kind permission of Peter Bentley, whose own sons had previously been members of the Cub and Scout group.

As it would appear that 1st Mobberley would now be homeless. Enquiries had been made as to the use of Mobberley Primary School on a temporary basis and discussions ensued as to whether the Scouts should purchase a pre-fabricated building from Saighton camp, a similar building to that which had been purchased for Forest Camp at Sandiway.

A suggestion was made that the Scouts join forces with the Guides, who were running the somewhat rundown building on Hall Bank which had been originally been bequeathed to the "youth of the village" by Miss Bishop.

The estimated cost to lay foundations, realignment of services and erection of a prefabricated building was estimated at a cost of between £15,000 - £20,000.

A meeting was held in May 1987 with Philip Vann as Chairman and Vera Edge, Ken Carsley of 5th Knutsford Scouts, Ernie Buckley, Ron Edge, Tony Leadbeater (5th Knutsford) Viv Pike and Mike Fenton. Ken Carsley suggested a similar building to that erected by 5th Knutsford and estimated a cost of between £40,000 - £50,000, i.e. a Marley pre-fabricated type building. Quotes were requested from Marley, Banbury and Cheshire Portable Buildings for a 60ft x 20ft x 8.10ft building to replace the present Guide Hut on land at Hall Bank, Mobberley.

A further meeting was held on 2nd June at which a representative from Leofric Buildings attended and gave a detailed quotation to the committee.

On 23rd June 1987 at which Ron Edge was elected Chairman. The meeting was attended by several representatives of Mobberley Parish Council, who were the Trustees of the land on which the Guide hut was situated.

An estimate of between £7,000 - £8,000 for the laying of foundations had been acquired and it was suggested that a representative from Marley Buildings be invited to the next meeting.

Lots of fundraising had been done but the fund was still £10,000 short of its target.

On 10th July 1987 a meeting was held at the Guide hut at which the proposed plans were shown to all residents of Hall Bank and details of fundraising done and planning were explained. One or two families raised objections to a new building, stating that it would be in competition with the Victory Hall with regard to lettings and some of the residents preferred the old wooden hut to be refurbished. The residents were informed that this would not be practical.

As a result of the objections raised by the local residents a prefabricated building was out of the question and the building would have to be built from Cheshire brick. The Parish Council supported the erection of a new building for the village but it meant that the committee would have to work hard to fundraise more monies.

Jean & Philip Vann received their Long Service Decoration.

It was at this time that Mobberley made the decision to move from Alderley District to Knutsford District, with the blessing of Alderley District.



1988

A building committee was formed:-Ron Edge, Chairman, Vera Edge, Secretary Philip Vann, Viv Pike (Guide leader), Ernie Buckley, Helen King (Assistant Guide leader) Mike Fenton – Treasurer & Sheila Buckley

As part of the fundraising efforts towards a new H.Q. Knutsford Gang Show went on tour and performed for two nights, 18th & 19th March at the Victory Hall, Mobberley. Several Cubs, Scouts and Viv Pike performed in the Gang Show on tour and proceeds from ticket sales went towards the building fund.

1989

The building committee met to discuss the failure to be able to erect a Marley type building. Jack Horsfall, a local resident and architect offered to draw up plans for a new H.Q. free of charge. These plans were submitted in June and passed in August 1989 and estimates were requested from local building companies. Complications arose with regard to the lease of the land on which the hut stood. Meeting would need to be held with the Parish Council.

In December, the committee accepted a quote from Lawrence Bardsley, a builder from Nether Alderley and previously of Mobberley, instructing him to start work on the building.



Building work commenced and the Parish Council agreed to fund the demolition of the existing wooden hut and the laying of the foundations for a new building.

The whole of the erection of the roof was donated by an anonymous local businessman.

Appeals for financial help went out in the Parish newsletter and Knutsford Guardian and donations came flooding in from local residents. Among the many donations received – Mobberley Parochial Church Council, The Bulls Head Bowling Club, Ilford, Mobberley W.I., the Prince's Trust and Granada Telethon.

Further appeals were made for professional volunteers to do electrical work, plumbing etc.

Mike Fenton retired as Treasurer and Ernie Buckley took over the role.

The Lease for the land was completed and duly signed.

Philip Vann retired from the committee and Jean & Philip retired from Scouting.

The building was made habitable in September 1990 and Groups starting using the H.Q. despite no electricity.

In November 1990 the electricity was installed with the help of Mike Brighouse and Steven Pike who borrowed a digger to dig the trench in the field to hold the cables to be installed by Manweb.

Plasterboard was donated by Harold Barker to line the ceiling of the H.Q.

Tony Boston-Davies took over as Scout leader.

1991

Carpet was fitted by Roland Jones, local carpet fitter of Hall Lane and David Broadbent, the local Blacksmith supplied and fitted the memorial plaque "Edward Morton

Memorial Scout & Guide H.Q. opened by Mrs M Morton - July 1991".


